

Introduction

Penny Rugs were borne out of the traditions of the early 1800's where people had to make do with what little they had.

From bits of wool scraps and felted wool scraps, they crafted functional items for their homes that reflected their creativity and ingenuity. A penny rug was used as a table mat most often, but could also be used as other decorative items for the home as well as the sewing basket.

Originally, the mats that were made to protect table tops were covered with stacks of "pennies". The pennies were circular pieces of wool that were cut using the coins of the day as templates. Coins were different sizes than our modern currency.

In particular, the US penny was about 1¼" which is much larger than our current coin. The stacks of graduated size pennies were placed side by side on early mats. Both the edges of the pennies and the outer edge of the mat were stitched with a blanket stitch.

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As time went by, the designs included appliqué work also. The inspiration for these designs often came from other familiar sources. This would include folk art of the person's ethnic community.

Quilt block patterns were the most common source of design elements. Each quilter made their wool work to reflect unique skills and tastes. It was fashioned as a useful and functional items that decorated the home. Functional items included needle books (to store your needles with thread), scissors sheaths (to protect your scissors), and candle mats (to protect your tables from wax which bonds to a shellac finish).

May you find inspiration in these patterns to bring your own unique brand of style into your home.

Care Instructions: All of the wool felt in our kits is a blend of 20-35% wool. Dry cleaning is recommended for cleaning. To press wool felt, use a steam iron on high.

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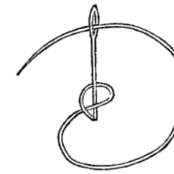

Stitches Needed

French Knot

Insert needle from the back side and wrap 1, 2, 3, 4 or 5 turns around the needle as shown. The more turns the bigger the knot. You can experiment on a scrap piece of fabric to see which size you like best.



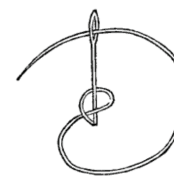
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Blanket Stitch

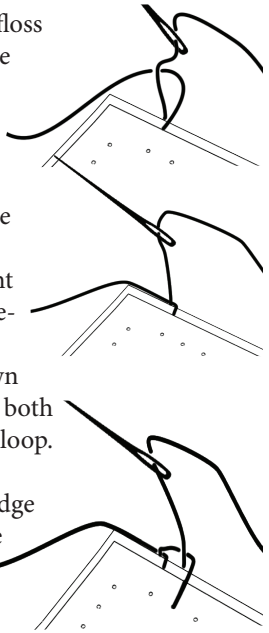
Thread the needle with floss and knot only one of the two ends.

The needle is inserted between two layers, then down through the bottom layer and up over the tail.

Pull the thread tight which will set the knot between the layers.

Insert the needle down into the fabric, through both layers, and up inside the loop. Then, pull tight.

Repeat this along the edge of the fabric until you have completed the edging.



Blanket Stitch

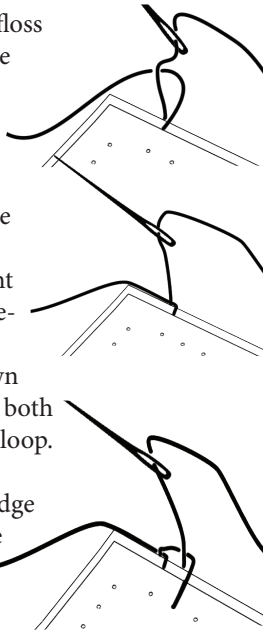
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The needle is inserted between two layers, then down through the bottom layer and up over the tail.

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Repeat this along the edge of the fabric until you have completed the edging.



The stitching should be evenly spaced and have the loop along the seam.

Chain Stitch

Insert needle from the back side and return to the back adjacent to the start. Pull the thread until a small loop is formed. Bring the needle back up about 1/4" away, in the direction of the chain, going through the loop and pull tight. Return to the back to form the next loop and up to the front about 1/4" away, through the next loop. Then pull the next loop tight. Repeat for to form the desired chain length.



Instructions

Using one of the front covers, layout the bird and wing as shown. Blanket Stitch the bird to the cover and the wing to the bird and cover.

The stitching should be evenly spaced and have the loop along the seam.

Chain Stitch

Insert needle from the back side put the needle back through adjacent to the start. Pull the thread until a small loop is formed. Bring the needle back up about 1/4" away in the direction of the chain through the loop and pull tight. Return to the back to form the next loop and up to the front about 1/4" away then pull the next loop tight. Repeat for to form the desired chain length.



Instructions

Using one of the front covers, layout the bird and wing as shown. Blanket Stitch the bord to the cover and the wing to the bird and cover.

Add feet to the bird using a Chain Stitch and add the eye to the bird using a French Knot.

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Assembly

Stack the finished front cover on top of the 2nd front cover. Blanket Stitch the top edge.

Place the front cover assembly on top of the two back covers and Blanket Stitch the outer edges.
